Richard Butler has suggested that the three ladies, Vera ERICKSEN, My ERIKSSON and the Duchesse of CHATEAU THIERRY should spend some hours for a few days at Ham. A copy of his note is at 186B. When I proposed this earlier, I understood that there were no facilities for accomodating women at Latchmere House.

If the circumstances have now changed and these women could be sent there, it might help to clear up the identity of the two other individuals acting as German agents in this country, with whom My ERIKSSON was in touch in 1938, and might help to clear up the identity of the mysterious individual who used the name of "Wilkinson" or some similar name.

I spoke to Stephens about this, and he gave the matter consideration. He has now replied that he feels that no good would come out of having the three ladies in question at Ham, except under rather exceptional circumstances which might be likely to provoke interesting reactions. He suggests that if they were brought to Ham the day that the story of De DEEKER and WALTI appears, this might provoke interesting reactions. On general grounds, however, he feels that the cases of these three women have been gone over so often and are now so out of date that normal procedures at Ham are not likely to obtain important results. I myself feel the same about this, and as the accommodation of three women would certainly strain the resources of Ham and need a good deal of organisation and collaboration with the authorities at Holloway, I should myself advise that it is now too late to take the action suggested.

I do not feel that Josephine F.E. ERIKSSON should be allowed to go to any camp from which women may at some time be repatriated. Since our letter of 20.2.40 she has been closely associated with Vera ERIKSON and also with Mrs Jessie JORDAN at Holloway. We should be very much opposed to any information she has obtained as a result of conversations that she has had with these women going back to Germany. There is absolutely no doubt whatever that My ERIKSSON is a German spy, although it would be impossible to obtain a conviction against her. She has in fact certain knowledge about espionage activities in this country which she has resolutely refused to divulge.

The real trouble in all these cases is that the Home Office have never really faced up to the problem of the internment of women. To begin with they had no places of internment and all women were sent to Holloway. The Germans then said "If you are going to imprison our women we will imprison yours". This led to a suggestion from the H.O. that we should release all the women who had been interned at the outbreak of war, and later that they should go back to Germany. The lesson was not learned, however, and Holloway was allowed to fill up again, until the moment came for general internment, when something really had to be done. It was then decided to start a camp for women in the Isle of Man. I am not absolutely certain that the above sequence of events is correct but it could easily be verified. I feel very strongly that unless and until some camp is established for women which is reasonably secure and from which no one will be repatriated until the end of the war, the problem of My ERIKSSON and others of her kind cannot satisfactorily be solved.



## Alfred STERN.

I have now seen Mr. Henry P. Arnholz of Russell & Arnholz, Solicitors, 5/6 Great Winchester Street, E.C., who told me that he had known Alfred STERN for about twenty-seven years. STERN's father was a rubber merchant and the son was employed in the business. During the last war, however, the father left this country for America and Alfred carried on the business. He is understood to have served in the British Army in France for a while. After the war, he devoted himself to the business which he turned into a most thriving concern with a turnover of something like £3,000,000 per annum. In due course, he turned the business into a Limited Liability Company and retired to live on his invested income, which, according to Mr. Arnholz, must be considerable.

Arnholz knew that STERN went to Canada about two years ago, but did not know the reason. He thinks it might possibly be connected with his health, which had been very bad for some years. He was apparently very well-known and popular on the Rubber Exchange and was a most generous man. Arnholz said he knew that he had helped some of his wife's relations. Mrs. STERN's maiden name was CURZON, and her family came from the Liverpool district. Prior to living at Chiltarn Court, the STERNs had a large house in Harlesden, and as a result, he took a great interest in the Willesden Hospital to which he gave a lot of money.

Mr. Arnholz expressed absolute confidence in Alfred STERN's integrity and loyalty to this country, and added that his pre-war views on European policy would have commended themselves to the Prime Minister! He does not know Mrs. STERN as well as her husband, and when he last saw her she was still living at Chiltern Court. He described her as "quite a nice person, who is fond of company", but added that STERN had told him that he was not very pleased with his wife's friends, though he never

mentioned anyone by name. Mr. Arnholz remembers once meeting Maria NERMI, whom Mrs. STERN introduced to him when she was endeavouring to interest people in her singing. He thinks that subsequently his wife went to a concert at which NERMI sang.

Mr. Arnholz feels quite certain that neither Alfred STERN nor his wife would knowingly have anything whatever to do with anyone who was not completely satisfactory from the security angle, but thinks it possible that their hospitality and generosity may have been abused when they were assisting lame dogs at Chiltern Court. He knows nothing about their travels abroad prior to the war, and I gathered that he had not heard from Mrs. STERN since she left London.

I found Mr. Arnholz, who incidentally is well-known to several members of the office in the legal profession and is well thought of by them, most anxious to help, but he pointed out that he saw most of Alfred STERN when he was actively engaged in business. He mentioned, in fact, that the consultations which he had with him were so long and numerous that he had to arrange a special fee - at the rate of 2 guineas an hour! In the course of conversation he mentioned that he was senior executor and trustee to Lord Northcliffe.

I should be very grateful if you could call on Messrs Ruffell & Arnholz of 5-6 Great Winchester Street, London E.C."., and ask them for any information they can give about an old client of theirs Mrs. Alfred STERN, now living at "The Flagstaff" Whitesmith, Chiddingly, Sussex, and her husband Alfred STERN; believed to be in Canada. You will see from 234a that Ruffell & Arnholz have acted for Alfred STERN for the last 26 years. When the STERNs applied for new passports in May 1938 Henry P. ARNHOLZ was their referee.

Mrs. Lilian Henrietta (Alfred)STERN is a British subject born Birkenhead 13.11.80., who has lately moved from Ilkeley, Yorks, to "The Flagstaff" Whitesmith, Chiddingly, Sussex. It is believed that her husband, Alfred STERN, has been in Canada since before the war, and that she has some thought of joining him there. Alfred STERN, who is of no occupation, is a British subject by naturalisation in 1897. He was formerly Austrian and was born at Libere&, Czechoslovakia on 15.11.88.

Mrs. STERN came to notice in the following circumstances:-

When Mrs. Josephine Fillipine Emilie ERIKSSON, (known as MY ERIKSSON) a Swedish subject, who was undoubtedly a German agent, was arrested on attempting to leave the country via Gravesend on 16.12.391, various names were found in her notebook, one of which was that of William WEISS, 4 Hyde Park Place, W.2. When subsequently questioned about WEISS, MY ERIKSSON said that she met him with the Duchess de CHATEAU-THIERRY and that he was a friend of the Duchess's friend Miss STERN, who had taken refugees under her wing.

William WEISS, a Czech expert in cattle breeding, has been questioned by Special Branch and states that some time after his arrival here in 1939, a Hungarian woman named Maria NERMI, said to be an operatic singer, put him in touch with a Mrs. STERN of Chiltern Court, Baker Street, who was a person of wealth and kept an open house for refugees of good connection who were

/friendless

friendless in London. WEISS visited Mrs. STERN's flat frequently, and several times met the Duchess de CHATEAU-THIERRY there. On one occasion the Duchess was accompanied by MY ERIKSSON, whom WEISS subsequently met again by appointment and took to his flat.

Enquiry shows that No: 93 Chiltern Court was occupied from 1938 or earlier by Mr. and Mrs. Alfred STERN; further that Mrs. STERN continued to live there till about June, 1940. We have one trace in our records, which shows that in May 1939, Albert JANOWITZ a Polish or German Jew, sent a letter from Poland through STERN of Chiltern Court to Prince MIODOWSKI, a Pole, who was arrested in January 1940, for obtaining a British passport by false pretences. JANOWITZ, who is gated, is known to have taken a prominent part in a conspiracy to obtain British passports for aliens by false pretences.

Incidentally, Vera ERIKSSON in a recent interview has referred to Mrs. STERN as one of the Duchess's more innocent friends, but I am anxious all the same to check up on her.

Particular points which I am anxious to clear up about the STERNs are:

(1) Their source of income.

(2) Whether they were much abroad in the years before the war and the names of any aliens with whom they/close connections.



When I visited Aylesbury prison yesterday I saw Miss Baxter who is acting as deputy to Miss Melanby, the Governor, who was away for the week-end and asked her whether any news of the publicity in the newspapers of the disturbance caused by the removal of Stella LONSDALE from Holloway to Aylesbury had reached the prisoners. She told me that they normally receive copies of certain papers in which this incident had been written up as headline news but in order not to let them know what publicity was accorded to their monkey tricks she had told them that she could not obtain their usual newspapers owing to the paper shortage and had given them a copy of the "Times" in which no mention of the disturbance was made. With any luck, therefore, they should not be able to learn of the publicity given to the disturbance they had caused or of the enquiries or questions in Parliament to which it might give rise.

Many thanks for your note of 7th July, about the arrangements which have been made in connection with the transfer of the five women detenues from Holloway to Aylesbury. I have put copies of your note in the My ERIKSSON and CHATEAU THIERRY files.

As regards the matters mentioned in the second paragraph on page 5 in the case of CHATEAU THIERRY and My ERIKSSON, it is desired to see both outgoing and incoming mail. So far as visitors are concerned, neither of these women have any relatives over here, except that CHATEAU THIERRY has her daughter, Valeska UHLIG. I do not think it necessary to be consulted before permits are given to ordinary prison visitors or to be consulted about any possible visit by Valeska UHLIG to her mother, as the visits by Valeska would be observed by the Prison authorities.

If, however, anyone other than ordinary prison visitors or Valeska UHLIG should apply for a permit to interview either of these two women, I should be grateful if the matter could be referred to me first.





# INTERNEES in the SPECIAL WING at Aylesbury

4 Jan 80

I visited Aylesbury Borstal Institution on 6.7.42, and was received by the Governor, Miss Mellanby who struck me as being an extremely sensible woman who appears to have the right ideas about how to deal with the hard cases who have recently become her charges.

Miss Mellanby seemed to be very pleased to see me as she has not previously had any 18B or 12 (5) A cases and I came away with the impression that she has not been properly instructed by either the H.O. or the Prison Commission in the handling of such cases. She is however on fairly safe ground as Miss Baxter an officer from Holloway has gone to Aylesbury and is quite familiar with the procedure and knows all the hard cases who have now gone to Aylesbury well.

I discussed the draft arrangements for dealing with letters and other communications and also with visits and the Covernor said that she did not think there would be the slightest difficulty in putting such arrangements into operation. She added however that the garden of the special wing is surrounded by a wall at the back of which there is a drive which is used by other prisoners including those in the Anna Wolkoff category and that it would be impossible to give any guarantee that messages were not thrown over the wall. I said that although we were most anxious that VICTOIRE should not be able to communicate with the outside world I did not think this trouble was a serious one as prisoners one different sides of the wall are unable to see each other and there is therefore no question of individuals being able to communicate with other prisoners of their choice. Other inmates of the institution know that there are now five special cases in the special wing but the Governor says that they do not know who or what they are and as most of the ordinary inmates are Borstal girls it is not likely that they will want to mix themselves up in any of the affairs or troubles of people about whom they know nothing and who they may guess are spies or at least people who are not fit to mix with them.

The only other difficulty the Governor saw in ensuring complete segregation was in connection with the library which is at the disposal of all prisoners and the chapel to which all are entitled to go at the same time during services. The special Internees will be allowed to go to the library when it is not open to other prisoners and at chapel they will be parked on one side accompanied by an officer and not allowed to commanded at with other prisoners.

In all other matters the Governor stated that there would be no difficulty in meeting the conditions which we feel should be imposed on these internees and I therefore told her that we would take the matter up with the Home Office as it was not our proper function to give instructions to her and that if our wishes were to be met then it would of course be through the courtesy of the Prison Commissioners.

At this point it may be worth stating how these five women have taken to their new surroundings. VICTOTAR being new to the game began by adopting a high hat attitude towards the Covernor but as soon as she saw that it would get her mounere she was as pales to act the steet little thing and has given no trouble at all. LOWSTALL evidently thought that the was in for some real trouble when she was told that she was to Isave Holloway and by the time she had been got when to the car she had scraped her back rather badly on a stone staticase and her clothes were all torm off. She was in fact so indecently clad that she had to be wrapped in sheets and blankets before she could be hended over. Both BOKEDALE and My ERIKSSON have now written letters to friends which they exhibit nothing but the highest praise for their new quarters and from the descriptions they give it is quite clear that they are highly delighted that they have been moved and I am not at all sure they do not think the move is in the nature of a priveledge bestowed upon them by a benevolent Government! CHATTAN TELEFRY has written to one of the inmates at Holloway in a way that indicates that she is almost as pleased as if we had given her a suite at Clarages. ERAFT has not yet written to any of her friends as far as I know but I understand she has theen to her new home well.

I was given one letter addressed to KRAFT which contains a letter from her solicitors about income tax matters and a number of alvidend certificates which will be passed to the officer sealing with her case in case he is interested to know details about the source of her income.

I was given two letters written by VICTOIRE, one for Mr Harmer and one for MR Green whose name she spells GRIM.

of Holloway asks for certain things left behind to be found and forwarded. This letter is being sent on to Holloway but a photostat is being sent to Major Whyte.

One letter from LONSDALE to her mother is being photographed and forwarded as is one from My EDIKSSON to a Christian Science practionner. The photostat is being passed to the officer dealing with the case as there is a mention of a certain Mrs Gerale STONE (Fulham 6022). There is also a letter from ERIKSSON to HOEENBERG an inmate of Holloway in which

We now propose to ask the Home Office to make arrangements whereby all mail both ingoing and aut-coming will be submitted to us for approval and all visits will also be made with the previous consent of M.I.S. The reason for this rather claber ate arrangement is that VICTOIRE must not be able to communicate with anyone either directly. As VICTOIRE, LONDOALE and KRAFT are all cases in which B.I.A is interested it is suggested that the mail for all five internees should be sent to B.I.A and that all requests for permission to receive visitors should be similarly addressed. It will probably be necessary for B.I.A Mr Harmer to read the out-going mail of all five internees in order that he should be assured that VICTOIRE is not communicating with anybody. That being so it would be a great bein if the Officers who are interested in CHATRAU THICHEN and My ERIKSSON would say



#### Regulations for Special Internees at Aylesbury

1. Subject to the exceptions mentioned in paragraphs 2-6 inclusive Internees will not be permitted to associate or have any contact with any other persons except fellow internees who are interned in the same part of the prison and arrangements should be made shereby it will be impossible for them to communicate with other prisoners and the outside world.

(A) All letters, both in-coming and out-going, will be subjected to 100% conservation by M.I.S., and in order that delay should be reduced to a minimum, Internees should be instructed (i) that out-going letters should bear the date on

(ii) that out-going letters should be handed to the

(B) It is desirable that when possible out-going mail should be posted to Box too. Parliament Street Box Office, London, S.W.l. so that it arrives the following day and can be examined and released with a minimum of delay. Out-soing inland mail will be posted in a letter box but overseas mail will be passed by M.I.S. direct to Postal Censership with a note to the effect that it has been seen by M.I.S. The number of out-going letters will not be restricted beyond the limits usually imposed in 18B cases.

(C) Incoming mail will be sent by the Prison Authorities to Box 500 and after examination by N.I.5 it will be returned to the Covernor with a note to the effect that M.I.5 have no

objection to it's going forward.

Should any of these Internees desire to be visited by a priest permission for such visit should be given by the Governor, but the priest should be told that if an Internee makes any statement outside the seal of the confessional it is his duty to report the full facts to the Governor. If a suitable priest is

not available M. I. 5 should be consulted.

7. The examination of mail by M.I.S. will be complementary to, and not in substitution for the normal prison censorship which should continue to operate as usual. Parcels will be examined by the Prison Authorities only but any written communication which they contain should be submitted to M.I.S.

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

I pointed out to you then that it was essential that VICTOIRE should not be permitted to mix with the ordinary 12(5A) internees and suggested that it might be possible to arrange accommodation in a prison for VICTOIRE and two or three other women of her kidney.

It is, of course, essential that VICTOIRE should not be permitted to appeal to the Lindley Committee and that she should not be allowed to have any communication with persons who may be released before the termination of hostilities.

Subject: Mrs Lilian Henrietta STERN of "The Flagstaff", Whitesmith, Chiddingly, Sussex. (Nat. Reg. No. ARPK/93/3)

I beg to state that I have made discreet enquiries regarding the above named person as requested in the letter, Ref. S/E, 1., dated 21st April 1942, received from Major GRASSBY.

"The Flagstaff", is situated in its own grounds some distance from the nearest neighbour, and is said to belong to a wealthy Jew named Mr SAULZ, who controls the "Ambassador Hotel", London. I have searched the records of the local Nat. Reg. Office and Food Office, but cannot find any trace of Mr SAULZ or wife having been registered in this district either for residence or food.

Owing to the isolated position of "The Flagstaff", it has been difficult to trace any person with knowledge of Mrs STERN, who seldom leaves the house, but Mrs SAULZ has remarked to a tradesman that Mrs STERN will be staying there for a long time.

Although Mrs STERN arrived at "The Flagstaff", about the date mentioned by Major GRASSBY in his letter, 21st March 1942, she did not visit the Food Office for the purpose of having her Ration Book altered until the 5th May. This is approximately six weeks and it may be thought that having managed so long without making the visit to the Food Office at once, Mrs STERN does intend to stay here for some time, or she would not now have troubled to visit the Food Office.

Mrs SAULZ lives at "The Flagstaff" generally and Mr

SAULZ spends most week-ends there.

Mrs STERN appears to be living at the house as a guest.
A reliable source of information has only been found during the last few days, but it is anticipated that further information may be obtained shortly when a report will be submitted.





Dear Major Grassby,

I am making a few more enquiries into the contacts of the well-known Mrs. Josephine Fillipine Emilie My ERIKESON (known as My ERIKSSON), a Swedish subject who was undoubtedly a Cerman agent, and who is now at Holloway.

When My ERIKSSON was arrested on attempting to leave the country via Gravesend on 16.12.39, various names were found in her note-book, one of which was William WEISS, 4, Hyde Park Place, W.2. When subsequently questioned about William WEISS, My ERIKSSON said she met him with the Duchess de CHATEAU-THIERRY, and that he was a friend of the Duchess's friend, Miss STEIN, who had taken refugees under her wing.

William WEISS, a Czech subject, born 25.9.93, who arrived in this country on 19.2.39. and is now living at 135; Sandringham Court, W.9., has now been interviewed by Special Branch. He states that he is an expert in the scientific breeding and fattening of cattle, and on paching this country in 1939 he called on a number of wzech and Hungarian produce marketing concerns in London in an endeavour to establish business connections here. While so doing, he made the acquaintance of a Hungarian named VARGHA, who introduced him to a Hungarian woman named Maria NERMI who was said to be an operatic singer. Maria NERMI told him about a certain Mrs. STERN, who then lived at Chiltern Court, Baker Street, W.1, and was a person of wealth who kept an open house for refugges of good education who were friendless in London. said that he was for business reasons, anxious to meet English people, and he therefore asked Miss NEWII to take him along to Mrs. STERN's flat. For seyeral months he was a frequent visitor to her flat and continued to call on her until about February 1940. WEISS several

times met the Duchess of CHATEAU-THIERRY at STERN's flat, and on one occasion she was accompanied by My ERIKSSON. Two or three days later, WEISS met ERIKSSON in Oxford Street by appointment, after which he took her to his flat at 4, Hyde Park Place. After some questioning he reluctantly admitted that he invited her solely for an immeral purpose. He saw her once again about a week before Christmas 1939, when she was on her way through London en route for Sweden.

Enquiry shows that 93, Chiltern Court is rented by Mr. and Mrs. Alfred STERN. We have one trace of them in our records, when, in May 1939, Albert JANOWITZ, a Polish or German Jew then in Poland sent a letter through STERN of Chiltern Court to Prince MIODOWSKI, a Pole, who was arrested in January 1940 for obtaining a British passport by false pretences. JANOWITZ, who is gated, is known to have taken a prominent part in a conspiracy to obtain British passports for aliens by false pretences.

Mrs. Lilian Henrietta STERN moved from Chiltern Court to the St. Pancras area in June 1940, and to Ilkeley, Yorks, in November 1940. She left Ilkeley on 21st March last, giving her destination as cho The Flagstaff, Whitesmith, giving her destination as cho The Flagstaff, Whitesmith, Childingley, Sussex. She is said to intua forming her humband in the near future, he has not yet applied to a punit.

I am considering the advisability of interrogating
Mrs. STERN about her connection with the Duchess of




