Your letter of the 27.12.41 to Renton, (who has now left us ,) has been passed to me. I am afraid that we should not now or at any future time be prepared to approve of this women's transfer to Port Erin. Since our letter of the 20.2,40 to which you refer, she has been closely associated with two other women in whom we are very interested at Holloway, and we should be very much opposed to any information which she has obtained from these sources going back to Germany, as it undoubtedly would if she were placed in any camp from which internees were subsequently repatriated. Moreover, the inevitable lack of effective security at Port Erin, which possesses practically none of the safeguards of an ordinary internment camp, makes it the worst possible place to send a woman of this type. Inspector Cuthbert, when I last spoke to him, expressed his concern at the possibility of escape to Ireland on fishing boats. This is a real danger since the layout of the Camp makes it impossible in practice to deny access to the quay to the internees, and indeed it is currently believed among them that in the early days three of their number did in fact escape by this means.

It is also worth remaking that any sympathy for Mrs.

ERIKESON's present situation would, in our opinion, be wholly misplaced. She is a German spy, who is lucky to be in Hollowny as a detainee instead of as a convict.

You will no doubt remember having made various enquiries into the different contacts of the above named Swedish subject, who is a German agent at present interned in Holloway. Inspector Rogers dealt with this case, and his last report was No: 405/41/933 of 20th May 1941.

When My ERIKSSON was arrested on attempting to leave the country via Gravesend on 16th December, 1939, various names were found in her note book. (Special Branch report 320/EPA/2389 of 16th December 1939 refers) These included the following:-

William WEISS, 4, Hyde Park Place, W.2.

Cyril MacKillin (now believed to be in France).

Marjorie BUCKLER Aero Club. (Now believed to be in Denmark).

Nellie NEUMANN, c/o Mrs. Lichtenstein, 18 Cleve House, Cleve Rd., N.W.6.

of these the last three seemed to have been written by Mrs. REIKSSON while in the train on her way to Gravesend, and her explanation was that Vera de SCHALBERG, a Dane of 195, Avenue Paul Derchanal, Brussels, had, while staying with Nellie NEUMANN before the war, asked her (MY) to obtain their addresses in order to enable her (Vera) to write to them. (Vera de SCHALBERG @ Vera ERICHSEN was, as you know, a German agent, who, prior to the outbreak of war, acted as housekeeper to the Duchesse de CHATEAU THIERY. She subsequently returned to this country, since the outbreak of war, as a German agent, and was arrested).

William WEISS is a Czech subject born 25.7.93 who is the subject of Metropolitan Police reports under the references 74/40/1847, H.O.W./
1157/2, the latest being dated 3.4.41. On 26.5.41 he moved to Machynlleth, Montgomeryshire, where he hoped to take up work on a farm which a friend proposed buying. He has, however, apparently returned to London as, according to the Central National Registration Office, his present address is 135, Sandringham Court, W.9. When questioned on 22.2.40 about William WEISS, My ERIKSSON said she met him with the Duchesse de CHATEAU THIERY, and that he was a friend of the Duchess' friend Miss STEIN, who had taken refugees under her wing.

We have made enquiries but it has not yet been possible to trace Marjorie BUCKLER.

I should be grateful if you would kindly arrange for both Cyril MacKENZIE and William WEISS to be interviewed and asked what connections, if any, they had with:-







Your AP. 122303 of 17th November has been passed to me by Colonel Hinchley Cooke as our files on Mrs. Josephine Fillippine Emillie ERIKSSON are in my possession. We have a number of volumes in the file on this woman, but of these volumes two covering inter alia the period December 1939 were, I very much regret to state, destroyed by enemy action. I have had a careful search made and there is no trace of this woman's Passport Papers, and it seems probable that they were in one of the destroyed volumes.

Our records show that in December, 1939 she was in possession of a Swedish Passport, number 81, issued in London on 23.7.34 and valid until 23.7.44. She was issued with an Exit Permit number 122303 valid until 11.1.40 (THRF/39/4) She had been issued in London with a Dutch visa, on 14.12.39, valid for a journey to the Netherlands within 2 months.

It is most regrettable that we are unable to return your file owing to circumstances beyond our control. If you should desire to reconstruct it as far as is possible, and would be so good as to let me know what details, additional to those given above, you require, I can assure you that I should be only too glad to do all I can to help in the matter.

William WEISS was, with his brother Hermann, a cattle-breeder in Vienna III St. Marx.

He was subsequently managing director of Bohumil Jirotka a Spol of 5, Liliova, Prague, a company formed in 1937 which conducted a research library for the adoption of patents and discoveries.

WEISS arrived at Dover from Calais on 19.2.39. He then had £1,000 to his credit at the Anglo-Czechoslovakand Prague Credit Bank London, allowed him by the National Bank of Czecho-Slovakia for the purpose of forming a company in this country, which he registered on 9.3.39. as Jirotka Products & Research Ltd. WEISS attempted to introduced two inventions in this country - a patent onion-peeling machine and a process for purifying mud, but both projects fell through and Jirotka Products & Research Ltd. now exists in name only, having hever engaged in any active business.

In the spring of 1940 WEISS was given permission to act as managing director of the Lytham Home Farm Produce Ltd. at a farm they proposed starting in Lancs., but the company never actually functioned. A proposal early in 1941 that he should manage a pigbreeding farm in Reading for a sausage manufacturer called Morris BLOOM of 111, Wentworth St., E., also came to nothing, as did a project of making cheese from ewes milk at a farm at Goring-on-Thames owned by a Mr. Harris of 80, Wardour St. W.1.

William WEISS has apparently lived at both 4 and 5 Hyde Park Place, W.2. On 26.3.41. he moved to Machynlleth, Montgomeryshire, where his address in April 1941 was the Wynnstay Hotel. He was interviewed on 15.4.41. by the Police, and stated he had gone to Wales at the request of Mr. Frank KOLISCH, Llwynygog, Pantperthog, Machynlleth, who intended buying a farm on which WEISS could work. Alternatively WEISS had a Hungarian friend in Torquay (believed to be the Baron Hatvamy) who intended buying a farm in Totness on which WEISS might work.

If both plans came to nothing he intended returning to London to seek another job.




